IRARC 2010 Field Day - By the Numbers

IRARC pulled together for a very good effort during the annual ARRL Field Day Exercise held on June 26th and 27th. The weather was unusually dry and very hot for late June - no thunderstorms this year! Overall the club logged 248 CW contacts from 58 sections and 117 phone contacts from 38 sections. For the CW ops, 24 contacts were made on 10 meters, 78 contacts on 15 meters, 62 con-

tacts on 20 meters, 63 contacts on 40 meters and 21 contacts on 80 meters. The phone gang racked up 5 contacts on 6 meters, 38 contacts on 10 meters, 25 contacts on 15 meters, 21 contacts on 20 meters, 26 contacts on 40 meters and 2 contacts on 80 meters. The GOTA station logs have not been counted as of the newletter publication but they did a great job with phone operations!





IRARC Solar Power Field Day Operations

Field Day operations could also be a green event as demonstrated by Dave Lerret, KU0R. Dave, K4UZM donated use of his trailer for the solar operated CW station operated on the Red Cross field east of the main buildings. KU0R's solar array consisted of 4 - 65 watt panels into 4-80 Amp-hour AGM batteries. The solar power was regulated by an 800 watt Morning Star Solar Controller. Inside the

trailer, KU0R operated an IC-7000 at full power and Yaesu FT8800 for 2 meter frequency coordination with the teams inside the Red Cross building. A WiFi 2.4 GHz link was established on the campus so all operators could use data logging software to assist with band coordination and avoid duplicate contacts.
