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CLUB MINUTES

Following the Pledge, Dave called for new members and guests and we had Richard Skibo, looking to become a Technician and Dave Welbourne KG4KYR who is a member of the club but has missed a few meetings. Dave reported that he has 5 people that want to take the Technician exam.

JANUARY, 2019

The last meeting minutes published was of the November meeting. A motion was heard to approve the November meeting minutes. A second was heard and the meeting minutes were approved by acclamation.

The Treasurer's report showed \$1963.82 in checking and \$1777.78 in the Equipment Fund. A motion to approve the Treasurer's report was heard, a second was heard and the Treasurer's report was approved by acclamation.

Dave KUOR reminded the audience that dues are still only \$18.

Tech report: Dave reported that all repeaters are up and operational. Two go- kits are assembled and there are parts for four.

Events: QRP on January 19; the Orlando Hamcation is coming up next month, February 8-10. We are considering having a table there. Do we want a table at Hamcation? Club members would provide stuff to sell and the club could collect a small commission. Del AK4EY offered some stuff to sell as long as it did not return. MS Walk is coming up in March and we will need volunteers.

Les W9BCH, our Emergency Coordinator, was absent due to scheduled surgery and his report will be deferred until the February meeting.

New Business: The budget is overdue and we were supposed to vote on it in November. Dave presented last year's budget and we will basically use last year's budget as a template for 2019. Dave outlined the expenses. A motion to accept the budget was heard then a second was heard and the budget was approved by acclamation. It can be found in the club web site.

Next Dave approached the subject of the IRARC radio room. Its a mess and we need to fix it up, in case of a storm. We need a place for Central Net. Viron pointed out that Central Net lost a couple of shelters to the North Net. Dave explained how two operators and two dual receive radios could be needed to support an emergency. Dave pointed out that there is no grounding system in the radio room. There is one an-

tenna that has lightning protection at the base of the antenna. Our 80/40 antenna was destroyed by grounds maintenance. The inside of the radio room is not set up for two operators. There is no emergency power in the radio room and at minimum we need 200-300 Ah of battery to run Central Net. How to charge the batteries will be a down the road decision, but solar power is very attractive. Greg AB4GO offered a discussion on how an earth ground was really not needed for the radio room.

There was \$34 in the 50-50 drawing and Dan KN4KKH was found to hold the winning ticket.

Following the 50-50 drawing an interesting video showed how to use SDR Sharp with your sound card, instead of the RTL 2832 USB dongle, to receive VLF radio transmissions and that on one occasion a VLF radio signal made it on to a pop music album and could be decoded by playing the music into the microphone jack and using the SDR Sharp software.

A motion to adjourn occurred at 2030 and was moved and approved.

"Station Computers" is the topic of the November 22 episode of the "ARRL <u>The Doctor is In"</u> podcast, "RF Safety" is the topic of the December 6 episode, "Ground Plane Antennas" is the topic of the next, and "Log Periodic Antennas" is the topic of the latest.

The Canadian National Parks on the Air event (CNPOTA) will get under way on January 1, 2019, and continue until year's end. All radio amateurs are invited to activate any of Park Canada's 48 national parks and 171 national historic sites, while "chasers" attempt to land a contact. Activity for activators and chasers will be tracked on a dedicated website and a real-time leader board, and opera-

Voyager 2 enters interstellar space. NASA announced that Voyager 2 has exited the sun's magnetic bubble and entered interstellar space. The 70s-era probe is now experiencing a blizzard of galactic cosmic rays as it charts the unexplored space between the stars. Its twin, Voyager 1, crossed the same boundary in 2012, but Voyager 2's crossing is arguably more significant because it carries a working instrument that can sense interstellar plasmas, providing the first in situ sampling of matter between the stars.

Normally, the stratosphere is free of clouds--completely transparent. That's because the stratosphere is very dry with a wide separation between sparse molecules of water. China has built a giant experimental radio antenna on a piece of land almost five times the size of New York City (it occupies some 3,700 sq km or 1,400 square miles), according to researchers involved in the highly controversial project. The Wireless Electromagnetic Method (WEM) project took 13 years to build but researchers said that it was finally ready to emit extremely low frequency radio waves, also known as ELF waves. Although the project has civilian applications - officially it will be used for earthquake and mineral detection and forms part of China's 11th five-year plan - it could also play a crucial role in military communications.

Everything you know about dipole (calculators) is wrong ...by Onno VK6FLAB

The other day I did an experiment. I searched for "dipole calculator" and using the first 20 results I calculated the length of a dipole suitable for 7.130 MHz. I chose the frequency for no other reason that there is a 7130 DX net every Monday, Wednesday and Friday and for the longest time I've been unable to participate due to the lack of a HF antenna in my new shack. So here's some things I learnt from doing this experiment.

Depending on which calculator I use, the length of my dipole can vary by over a meter from longest to shortest result.

Depending on my desire to use metric or imperial measurements, my dipole will be a different length, because of course electrons move at a different speed if you're not using the metric system.

In case you're wondering, 1 inch is defined as being exactly 2.54 cm, so there's plenty of opportunity to vary that.

Speaking of standards, we all agree that the speed of light is a constant, right? Turns out that for some calculators, you can change the speed of light.

I'll skip over the notion that none of the calculators actually show what they're using as the speed of light and move on to other interesting discoveries.

Apparently you can determine the length of a dipole down to the sub-atomic length, with one calculator going down to the size of an electron to indicate how much wire you should cut from a spool.

There are forms that make doing the calculation really easy, single box to type in the frequency, so the answer must be right.

There are some that use random standard numbers, even a text book example that uses some number, but no indication where it comes from. For example, the number 486 features regularly, but so does 150 and 5905.

There are forms that provide you with several boxes, but no indication which box needs what value, so your answer may or may not indicate the number of eggs per

chicken per parsec.

One dipole calculator result is actually for a vertical, so your search engine helping you might not actually give you the calculator you expect.
There are percentage correction factors. 5% seems to be a favourite number, but no indication as to what the origin of that number is.

There's a calculator that allows you to specify the feed point impedance, not sure how that works, but it's a nice feature to have when you're calculating the length of your dipole. Not. One regular instruction is to cut long, that is, measure your wire and cut it longer than the calculator states. How much longer is left as an exercise to the reader. Should it be 1 mm longer, 1 cm longer, or should it be 1 m longer and how much should that change if the frequency changes? Let's move on. The word ground features heavily in these calculators. The phrase "average ground" does too. No indication as to what makes an average ground, or how to go

average.
We all agree that the dipole should be half a wave-length above the ground, right?
How much is that?
The same wave length as the

changes if your ground isn't

about determining what

The same wave length as the length of the dipole we've just calculated, or a different one? How does the length of the dipole vary if the height varies? While we're looking at variation, how much variation is there depending on how thick the wire you're using is and what about insulation? None of those things are even mentioned in any of these calculators.

Dipole calculators, wonderful invention, shame about the implementation.
